EARLY SHOCK THEN BARRETT SAVES IT

JOHN LAWSON at the City Ground

TERRY AUSTIN, a £20,000 replacement for Paul Mariner, gave struggling Plymouth a shock 12th minute lead against injury-hit Nottingham Forest here this afternoon.

The breakthrough came after Colin Barrett,

Forest's midweek Cup hero, had missed a third minute penalty.

Forest spent most of the time on attack, but lacked the width to undu-ly trouble a battling

Plymouth defence.

In the absence of John McGovern, Lloyd captained Forest and he was soon mar-shalling his defence as Plymouth attacked from the kick-off.

But in the third minute, the depleted Reds wasted a gilt-edged chance of taking the lead, when Barrett missed a

lead, when Barrett missed a penalty.
Woodcock, back in the side after injury, robbed Peddelty in midfield to burst through into the area. Sutton and Peddelty gave chase and it was the former Ipswich defender who brought Woodcock crashing to the ground.
Referee Reynolds had no hesitation in awarding a penalty, but with Curran and Robertson missing, the responsibility fell on Barrett, the two-goal hero in mid-week.

STOPPED

He strode forward to hammer a right-foot shot low to Ramsbottom's right and the keeper got down quickly to parry his effort. He also stopped a follow-up shot from Barrett and then Bowery had a close-range drive scrambled away.

It was a great disappointment for Forest, but they continued to take the attack to the visitors.

Clark won the ball decisively in a tackle with Hall to give Bowyer the chance to curl a menacing cross into the middle and O'Hare was only just squeezed out on the edge of the sixyard box.

The driving determination of Chapman acted as a spur to Forest, but Plymouth continued to break down Forest's attacks when they neared the 18-yard area.

The Reds came back, however, and after Ramsbottom had pushed away an O'Neill cross under pressure from O'Hare, Bowyer pulled a left-foot drive across the goal and out of play.

O'Neill and Anderson were involved in another persistent move that led to Wood-cock crossing for Barrett to head just outside the angle.

Forest could not be faulted for enthusiasm and Ramsbottom had to scurry around his area to prevent the Reds capitalising on another heated attack.

Bowery eventually brought the ball free from a packed goalmouth but his at-tempt was blocked.

Forest remained on the attack and Ramsbottom had to be alert at the near post to deal with a Barrett cross.

Just before half-time, a foul by Horswill on O'Neill gave Anderson the chance to land a free kick into the Plymouth defence but Sutton rose well to beat Bowery in the air and head away.

A run by Bowery had Plymouth's defence in some confusion and with Bowyer sneaking in unnoticed, it was as well for the visitors that Green turned the ball away. Plymouth readily conced-

ed corners and although Lloyd got his head to one Bowyer cross, he was off target.
